

If you only listened to the rhetoric and opining of the collective American voice throughout the past year, no one could accuse you of foolishness if you concluded that society must be crashing and burning right in front of our eyes. We seem to peddle in doomsday prophecies, worst-case scenarios, cumulative outrage, and drawing up verbal battle lines with those whose positions differ from our own in the smallest of ways. But as we sail on into 2016, I'm reminded that the Church is called to be salt and light in the world, and that these two characteristics can be more prevalent and powerful in tense and tumultuous times.

For much of the Fall semester, the letter to the Hebrews was our primary biblical text for worship. As I think back on its message, I'm encouraged that the God who brought so much of his plan to fruition in the life, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus, will surely do the same through his people and the Church, in our current age, and ultimately through Jesus again whenever the end finally comes.

It very well may be that the process of living out our Christian calling develops some new challenges that are unique to our ever-changing world, but that really isn't any different from most of our Christian brothers and sisters that have gone before us. I am again reminded of the words of Hebrews:

For we do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are—yet he did not sin. Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

Hebrews 4:15-16

So for all of the challenges and victories that 2016 may bring, both to us as a church and to each of us individually, let us trust that the God who has fulfilled his plan of salvation in Jesus is also able to sustain us and bless us as we seek to follow him more faithfully every day.

We were blessed to visit our kids in the Middle East this Christmas season. They have lived there for five years and have delivered both of their children in the local hospital. Our grandchildren will not have a U.S. birth certificate. They have a "Born Abroad" birth certificate. No issue in the least, other than just another realization they are not in the U.S.

There are plenty of other reminders they are not here. Salsa, peanut M&Ms, pecans, chocolate chips and Christian books for the grandkids are always packed in an extra bag when we visit. Stop signs as a suggestion, perilous traffic circles, unmarked speed bumps and the continual symphony of horns provide ample reasons for them to be homesick.

Paul might have been a little homesick himself when the Holy Spirit inspired him to pen the words to the Philippians, "our citizenship is in heaven." Though our passport is not from this world, we can easily get accustomed to its culture. The last time our son was home, he ran through the stop sign in our neighborhood. I had to remind him he was in a different culture. Sometimes we need to do the same in our spiritual journey.

As you read through the Focus Report, I hope you see the stories and examples of those who have recognized we are only here on a work visa. We may be "born abroad," but thankfully the Kingdom of God is always with us, around us, and in us. Our citizenship in the Kingdom doesn't mean we should expect comforts from this culture and society. On the contrary, it actually required an incredible sacrifice to be made available to us this side of eternity and calls for the same from us.

So celebrate with us what the Lord is doing in this place that is not our home.

Facilities Update

New Learning Center Chiller

We were blessed with sufficient cash flow from last year's budget to replace the 130-ton AC chiller for the Learning Center. The \$110,000 project went smoothly and did not require us to access reserves.



Mission Training Center

Long sought after and much awaited, we have received approval from Clear Lake Water Authority to complete the parking lot for the Mission Training Center. To compensate for the building and the parking lot, we are required to construct a detention area at the back of the property. The detention area will collect rain water, allowing it to be slowly released into the storm drains but will otherwise be dry.

To lower costs and to add a great feature to the Pavilion, the excavated dirt is being used to create a berm on the west side of the pavilion. It will provide an opportunity for future event viewing as well as great play space for our kids (and adults who act like kids).

The additional generosity of the donor is allowing us to complete the outside of the Mission Center and activate the storage area for our disaster relief and construction equipment. The training rooms, restrooms and additional storage will be completed when we are resolved with the architect's estate.

Pavilion

To prevent any loss of our investment, we have completed several aspects of the Pavilion. We will continue with additional improvements (sidewalks, stamped concrete, utilities) within the current funding. Completion of the roof, restrooms, food serving area and multimedia equipment will be completed when we are resolved with the architect's estate.

NOTE: We have updated our procedures for our Capital Projects with the lessons learned from the untimely passing of our architect and general contractor.

Children's Area Renovations

Our largest area of growth in attendance is in our preschool and children's ministries. We moved our children to the second floor of the Learning Center with the plans to renovate the space.

The Children's Area Remodel Steering Team has met with a new architect and contractor and is updating the remodel plans for the Children's Ministry area. Final plans and **updated projected costs** will be available in January 2016. We have raised \$280,000 toward the remodel.

THE VISION

There is great value in creating a safe, fun and welcoming environment for our children—a place where kids love coming to church and can't wait to come back.

When we reach children, we reach families. And through families, we impact the future of our church and God's Kingdom.



Our plan is to renovate the children's space and renew the Children's Ministry identity by becoming **UBC Kids in FLIGHT** (Kids Faithfully Living In God's Holy Truth).

As we create this new Children's Ministry area, we are asking you to "join the journey," inviting children to join in the spiritual journey of belonging, preparing and serving, helping them envision how they can serve in their community and around the world and inspiring them to reach their full potential in Christ.

THE NEW SPACE

When people step into the Children's Ministry area, they will know that kids are important at UBC! The welcome area will be open, fun and inviting. Parents will feel confident that their children will be safe and well cared for during their time with us.

As they walk to the classrooms, they will see the values of UBC. One hallway will be transformed to remind kids of the important faith skills that are part of their journey in Children's Ministry: learning to navigate the Bible, memorizing scripture, praying, sharing their faith and worshiping God with their life. The other hallway will encourage kids to find their place of service by highlighting the mission opportunities at UBC.

The Great Room will be an exciting and fun place for large group worship and activities.

The new space will be ideal for all the Children's Ministry activities: WBS, Bible Blast, Bible Drill, Children's Choir, GAs and RAs. And, it will allow us to continue to reach out to the community to provide a meeting place for organizations such as Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Reach Co-op.

THE PLAN

Planned Improvements:

- Update and enlarge the check-in area to provide a welcoming experience for members and guests
- Reconfigure bathrooms moving the entrance out of the "public traffic" area to improve safety
- Install new signage to direct parents to rooms
- Modify rooms to maximize space
- Paint hallways to inspire kids in the areas of belonging, preparing, serving
- Update lighting and sound in the Great Room to accommodate children's large group worship time and activities

THE PROPOSAL

Updating funding requirements will be available with the completion of the design with the new architect.

The improvements will be completed in three planned phases (as funding is available):

Phase 1: Remodel bathrooms and welcome area

Phase 2: Modify classrooms and hallways

Phase 3: Update Great Room

THE RESPONSE

The need is now, so we ask you to prayerfully consider supporting the effort to transform the children's area. We are asking the Lord to provide enough one-time gifts to immediately start the project and enough monthly gifts to complete the project within four months.

Making a Difference in Thailand

In collaboration with several other individuals from greater Houston, a team from UBC took the trek of a lifetime to Thailand for several weeks in October. They engaged with people in many different ways and in many different parts of Thailand. Their primary focus was to bring joy and increased quality of life to orphans through education programs, fun activities and health screenings.

The trip brought team members face-to-face with the very difficult issue of global poverty, especially on the day that was spent ministering to people who literally live in a dump on the outskirts of town. Additionally, the team was blessed to meet church leaders from among the Karen refugee population residing in Thailand.

Giving Help a Helping Hand

Houston is the fourth largest city in the country and it also ranks high in instances of human trafficking. Survivors of sex trafficking, in particular, often struggle as they attempt to reintegrate into society and into the work force after having experienced abuse and trauma.

To show respect for the efforts of survivors to start a new life in the face of challenges, and for those that help them, UBC honored Redeemed Ministries (www.redeemedministries.org), a Houston area nonprofit organization offering social services and other support that responds to the needs of women who have been trafficked for sex.


Redeemed operates a 4-bed safe house that is designed as a long-term care facility providing the initial care needed to begin restoration and rehabilitation toward a life of wholeness and independence. They have designed a yearlong program to provide holistic healing, addressing spiritual, physical, emotional and relational needs for women. They also provide therapy that is trauma informed, case management, life skills training, job skills training and also enrichment programs and recreational activities. These things are all necessary in order to help victims become survivors, but these things are also expensive.

The fundraising coalition from UBC responded to the overwhelming needs by inviting people from the community to a celebration luncheon and fundraiser for Redeemed Ministries. They were able to show respect and support for the work of founders Dennis and Bobbie Mark, for the Redeemed staff and for the survivors themselves. Over 150 people attended the event and heard stories about the programs and positive outcomes of Redeemed Ministries. At the end of the event, over \$80,000 in pledges were received in order to help the ongoing work of Redeemed Ministries.









When a Basket is So Much More...

The global violence we see in the news has real impact in our city of Houston as we welcome refugees from around the world. As many as sixty million people are displaced in the world as refugees, and they are migrating anywhere they can to escape violence and oppression.

As a community of faith dedicated to being the presence of Christ among all nations, some UBCers decided to do something meaningful to welcome refugees who have recently relocated to Houston.

In partnership with Interfaith Ministries Refugee Services of Houston, UBC families and individuals teamed up to provide welcome baskets to local refugees. Laundry baskets were filled with staple food items such as rice, canned goods, dried beans, fresh fruit and gift cards from local grocery stores.

After a brief training on cultural sensitivity, the UBC volunteers were paired with each other and, on November 22, went out to deliver the goods to expectant refugee families from the Congo, Iraq, Syria, Somalia, Burma, Bhutan and Eritrea.

Although the baskets of food items were only a small gesture of support, it is our hope that they helped refugee families feel like they are a welcomed part of the diverse Houston community. We respect all of them for enduring such hardship, suffering and while still maintaining the hope for relief.

Creating Space and Breaking Bread

In December, UBC Serving Ministries began a new partnership with The Mercy Tree, a local, non-profit organization that assists and feeds homeless individuals (www.themercytree.org). Our intent is to literally "create space" for fifteen to twenty Mercy Tree clients each week by sharing our building with them.

Each Thursday, UBCers will have the opportunity to interact and have table fellowship in the Chapel with people who are living the "Clear Lake experience" from a very different vantage point.

In supporting The Mercy Tree, UBC indirectly partners with several other Christian churches in the area. (Clear Lake Church of Christ, Southeast Church of Christ, Ecclesia Clear Lake, and Gloria Dei Lutheran Church all host Mercy Tree clients for daily lunches each week.) This opens the way to even further collaboration with these churches that want to make a positive difference in the lives of homeless people in our city.

If you work nearby or are otherwise available at lunchtime on Thursdays (any time between 11:30 am-1:30 pm), you are wholeheartedly invited to stop by and share space at the Lord's Table with us as we break bread together.

First Residents Arrive at UBC's New Townhome

In mid-December, UBC welcomed the first missionary family to reside in our church townhouse, located at Space Center and Bay Area. The family will be in residence through July 2016, and they will have several opportunities to talk at UBC about their experiences living in Southern Asia and insights related to culture and religion in that part of the world.

Thanks to the decorating team, led by Kala and Chelette Baker (along with other volunteers), who worked for many days to acquire furniture for the missionary residence and to decorate it to welcome the family on their arrival.

Serving Ministries

Your Serve Ministry Launches

After several months of intensive background work by our UBC staff and many volunteers, we are ready and excited to launch one of our newest ministries, *Your Serve.* The primary purpose of this wonderful ministry will be to enlist a greater number of UBC members to serve in the various UBC ministries.

The project began several months ago when UBC ministry leaders, both paid and volunteer, submitted ministry service opportunities that currently exist at UBC. We were amazed to discover that there are almost three hundred different ways to serve the Lord via the ministries of University Baptist Church!

These ministries were collected in a database and correlated with the IOLAS questionnaire, based on the interests and ministry serving values assigned to each ministry service opportunity. The database was reviewed by the UBC staff and beta tested with UBC staff members and several UBC volunteers.

Beginning in January 2016, every adult church member who joins UBC will be given an opportunity to complete a short ten-minute online questionnaire, which will be emailed to the church member by one of our **UBC Connection Team Member** volunteers.

After the new member completes the questionnaire, a **Connection Team Member** will contact the new member and arrange a time to visit with him or her, either by phone or in person, and to discuss the results of the questionnaire.

During the visit:

- The new member will select one or more ministry service opportunities and discuss these service opportunities with the **Connection Team Member**.
- Once the new member has chosen one or more UBC ministry service opportunities to further investigate, the Connection Team Member will give the new member the contact information of the UBC Ministry Leader responsible for overseeing the ministry choices of the new member.
- The **Connection Team Member** will also contact the appropriate **UBC Ministry Leader**, providing the contact information of the new UBC member and informing the **UBC Ministry Leader** to expect a call from the member.
- The new member will contact the appropriate **UBC Ministry Leader** to arrange a time to discuss serving in the respective ministry.

Each month, the Primetimers enjoy friendship and fellowship through events such as entertaining dinners and fun, educational trips. In the last few months, their delicious dinners have included worldrenowned pianist/soloist Beverly Terrell of Second Baptist Church of Houston, singing group Men of Praise, gifted vocalist Lisa Pierre and special guest and UBCer Pamm Muzslay.

Throughout the year, the Primetimers held seven exciting trips, which have included places like Shangri La Botanical Gardens, Hemi Hideout, the Texas Hill Country, Lanier Library and Stone Chapel, the Holocaust Museum and a concert at Sagemont Church.

You always remain in our prayers and we urge you to pray for us daily as we continue to serve Him each day of our lives.



He also talked to the children about what firefighters look like when wearing all of their gear so the children would feel comfortable around firefighters if they are ever in an emergency situation. What a wonderful opportunity for our children!

Operation Christmas Child

For November's mission, Weekday Ministries chose Operation Christmas Child, a mission-based effort organized by Samaritan's Purse—a nondenominational evangelical Christian organization providing spiritual and physical aid to hurting people around the world.

Students start with an average-size cardboard or plastic shoebox, determine the recipient's age (from 2 through 14 years) and gender. They add a "wow" toy (like a doll, soccer ball with pump, or stuffed animal), then add other fun toys, hygiene items and school supplies. Most importantly, the children are asked to pray for the recipients and to include a personal note or photo.

These boxes, that were filled with treasures to be shipped all over the world, were gathered in the Chapel and the children of Weekday Ministries prayed over each child who would receive one. We have such giving students!

Service of Lessons & Carols

On a brisk Sunday evening, December 13, UBC's congregation and Bay Area guests gathered in anticipation to experience UBC's Worship Ministries' annual Christmastime service—an adaptation of a liturgical work that has been celebrated around the world for almost a century. Originating at the King's College in Cambridge, A Service of Lessons and Carols traditionally features nine Scripture lessons with accompanying carols, and UBC's annual adaptation is a Christmastime favorite enjoyed by many.

Through beautiful music and the spoken Word, the sounds of Christmas emanated throughout the Worship Center, which was draped in the warmth of greenery and the glow of white lights. The timbre from each reader's voice brought Old and New Testament scriptures about the prophecies and birth of Jesus to life. UBC's Chamber singers, orchestra, and adult bells and choirs graciously shared their talents as they performed melodious Christmas carols, anthems and instrumental pieces. At the end, a festive reception was held in the Fellowship Hall. It was truly another heartwarming and spirit-filling performance.

Saviour: A Modern Oratorio

In two services on Sunday morning, December 20, over 1,600 UBC congregants and Bay Area guests settled into the Worship Center for a multi-sensory experience.

Through twelve captivating works of music and dance, Saviour: A Modern Oratorio was told through the talents of UBC's choir, orchestra, soloists, media team, and special musical and dance quests, conveying the story of God pursuing His people, from creation through resurrection.

Images of Jesus' life and beautiful landscapes were projected across the back walls, and paired beautifully with Ad Deum, a Houston-based professional modern/contemporary dance company that performs interpretive works of dance. Attendees enjoyed the active live dance scenes, which included tempting snakes in the Garden of Eden, a king's struggle for power without God, and a flowing, red-scarf performance symbolizing the ultimate sacrifice of Christ.



As the orchestra played their ambitious scores, the choir rang out, pairing poetic, free verse vocals with thoughtprovoking lyrics. Christian-recording artist and special guest Adam Paul Williams graciously performed as an orotund tenor, and complimented the other male and female soloists.

A UBCer wrote of her experience with Saviour:



I wanted to let you know how much I loved our *Saviour* performance. It had a couple of special meanings. For starters, my daughter attended. (I didn't know my husband was letting her stay in the Sanctuary, and I only saw her after we filed into the choir loft.)

She accepted Christ earlier this year, but [this] was the first time she had seen photos of the Crucifixion (other than what is in children's Bibles). The videos and photos were stunning. She spent time during the performance quizzing my mom, whom she was sitting beside, about the crown of thorns and the three crosses, etc. What a beautiful way to continue conversations with her regarding her salvation and what Jesus did for us. I was able to follow up with her after church and answer more questions.

The next day, after my mom returned home, she drove an acquaintance to work. She was telling her passenger about the *Saviour* performance. Mom summarized the whole production as well as her conversation with my daughter after seeing the images of the Crucifixion. The lady began to cry. As they were driving, they passed a house in the country with a sign that her friend read out loud: "Do you know where you would go if you died today?" My mom asked her if she had an answer to that question. She said, "No." My mom asked if she wanted to have an answer and she replied, "Yes!" Mom pulled off the side of the road, prayed with her, and led the lady to Christ!

I just wanted to say thanks again for all your hard work. It is a beautiful thing to see the fruits, know how God was glorified, and how others were encouraged in their faith as a result of this effort.
